Light local turnout seen in Republican primary

Less than 7 percent of voters turned out in Tuesday's Republican primary election, with local voters choosing Joe Tegerdine to run against Gene Taylor for the 4th Congressional District seat in November.

Unfortunately for Tegerdine, though, it was his opponent, Steven Palazzo, who garnered the majority of votees throughout the District, carrying 57 percent of the total with 15,389 votes. Tegerdine received 11,455 votes, or 43 percent of the total.

Local primary returns

Unofficial returns from Tuesday's Republican Party primary in Wayne County to determine who will face incumbent Democrat Gene Taylor in November's general elections:

Joe Tegerdine	528
Steven Palazzo	271

In Wayne County, Tegerdine, who made numerous visits to the county during his campaign, garnered nearly two votes to Palazzo's one. With all

precincts reporting, Tegerdine took home 528 votes, or 66.08 percent, to Palazzo's total of 271, or 33.92 percent.

A total of 799 ballots were cast during Tuesday's primary in Wayne County, meaning that only 6.5 percent of the registered votes went to the polls.

Turnout is expected to be slightly higher in November when the general election for congressional seats is held, but local races feature few candidates and even fewer opposed races, meaning the turnout could be small among county residents.

Police make arrest in 17 month old's death

Stepfather arrested and charged with murder after preliminary autopsy says child's death a homicide

A Waynesboro man has been arrested and charged with murder after the weekend death of a 17-month-old child.

Scott Druex Smith, 27, was arraigned by Judge Charles Britton on Tuesday after being charged over the weekend with murder involving the death of 17-month-old Ally Waldrop. Waldrop was transported to Wayne General Hospital late Friday night and was pronounced dead there.

Smith was arrested as part of the original investigation, then was charged with murder after an autopsy report was released to officials. Waynesboro Police Chief Jimmy Bunch announced the charges during a press conference Tuesday morning.

“At approximately 10:18 p.m. on Friday, May 28, the E-911 Center received a call from a female resident requesting an ambulance, stating that her child was not breathing,” Bunch said in a statement. “The child, Ally Waldrop, was transported to Wayne General Hospital via ambulance.

“Emergency room personnel requested that a police officer

also be dispatched to the emergency room. Lt. Randy Pettus arrived at the hospital and immediately called for an investigator. Senior Criminal Investigator Wesley Waites was dispatched to the hospital, as well as myself and Lt. Chris Harris.”

Law enforcement officials assessed the situation and began its investigation into the case, Bunch said.

“Upon arrival at Wayne General Hospital, it was determined that the 17-month-old child was deceased,” he said. “Wayne County Medical Examiner David Pugh was dispatched to the scene and the body was taken to Jackson for an autopsy to determine the actual cause of death.

“Statements and evidence were collected at the hospital, as well as from the residence on Wayne Street.

County pays homage to military's fallen members

Veterans and community members gathered Monday, May 31 to pay their respects to the nation's fallen soldiers during the annual Wayne County Memorial Day observance at the Waynesboro City Auditorium.

The patriotic-themed program began with a posting of the national and state flags by the 3656th Maintenance Co., an invocation by the Rev. Whit Lewis of Calvary Baptist Church in Waynesboro, the Pledge of Allegiance led by Daphne McCarty and

The National Anthem sung by Wayne County High School choral instructor Amy Pruitt.

CW4 (retired) Roy Felts paid tribute to the former members of the military in the audience, and asked that the audience also remember those who died in service to their country.

The keynote speaker for this year's program was Lenora Fort, who serves as a military services coordinator at Camp Shelby in Hattiesburg for the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Fort has the responsibilities involved with seeing to the needs of

demobilized troops coming back from campaigns in Iraq and Afghanistan, as well as addressing the needs of military dependents and survivors.

“Our purpose in gathering today is to pay tribute to the great and brave Americans that, through their valor and bravery, have secured our freedoms,” Fort said. “Our hearts go out to the spouses and loved ones left behind by a fallen soldier ... we can share your sorrow, but we will never know your grief.”

Revette, 10 others memorialized by families, companies

JACKSON — A Transocean-hosted memorial service for Wayne County's Dewey Revette and 10 others that lost their lives in the Deepwater Horizon oil rig explosion last month was held here Tuesday, May 25 at the Convention Center.

The service featured a time of prayer led by Transocean North America Human Resources Manager Larry Mills, music from a gospel choir as well as the band Diamond Rio, and a videotaped tribute from former oil field worker and superstar country musician

Trace Adkins.

Transocean CEO Steven Newman addressed the audience, which included family members of those lost in the April 20 explosion in the Gulf of Mexico.

“We've gathered as a community ... a community none of us wanted to be a part of,” he said.

“This is a time of loss and remembrance where our faith has been tested by this tragedy.”

Newman told family members, friends and co-workers that his heart was broken for the loss of the 11 men — nine of which worked with Transocean, and two others that worked with M-I SWACO.

Aldermen look at facility use fees, rules

The Waynesboro Board of Aldermen took a look at various rules and fees for the City Auditorium and other facilities Tuesday night, opening the door for groups wanting to hold for-profit events to rent the facilities.

During the May meeting of the Board, an Auditorium Committee was established to look at possible improvements and fee structures for that facility. The committee came back with a number of recommendations.

They included changing the locks on some interior doors

to better isolate the kitchen area from the larger area; addressing parking lot draining issues; improving the landscaping around the building; lowering the spotlights or re-directing the air conditioning duct work so as not to block the spotlights; and raising the decorating fee to \$50 per day.

The old decorating fee was \$25 per day and was limited to two days before the event. The committee calculated that it cost \$37.50 per day for utilities at the facility, necessitating the increase in that fee.

“I would like to delete from the rules where it says the

auditorium cannot be rented to for-profit organizations,” Alderman Greg Johnson said. “I think if we eliminate that rule, then we can begin to get some entertainment into the city that would benefit everyone.

“I would also like to amend the security provision in rules. Right now, it says that groups must provide security for all dances. I would like to change that to all public entertainment functions, not just dances.”

Johnson said those changes could bring in more events.

WPD investigating sexual misconduct case

An investigation into an alleged sexual misconduct charge is continuing, and no arrests have been made in the case.

Waynesboro Police Chief Jimmy Bunch confirmed on Tuesday that an investigation into the incident has been ongoing for more than two weeks now, and leads are still being followed and evidence gathered in the case to determine if charges should be filed.

Bunch said he was not able to speak specifically about

the incident at this time, as the investigation is still taking place.

“We are investigating complaints of sexual misconduct surrounding an incident that occurred about two-and-a-half weeks ago,” Bunch said. “The incident allegedly happened inside the city limits, but that is all I can say about it at this time.”

Bunch said investigators are continuing to gather any potential evidence while also conducting interviews and taking statements from possible witnesses and others involved in the case.

Details in the case are sketchy at best right now, as rumors have been going through the community about what may or may not have happened in the incident.

Bunch said his officers are doing a thorough job of gathering all the facts.

“We are still doing interviews, taking statements and looking for any possible physical evidence,” Bunch said. “If the allegations prove to be true, then we will make some arrests. Until that time, though, I can't comment any further on this incident.”

Aldermen give Waynesboro Optimist Club administrative authority of Hogan Park facilities

Waynesboro's Board of Aldermen granted the Waynesboro Optimist Club administrative authority over Hogan Park and its facilities during Tuesday night's regular monthly meeting.

Members of the Optimist Club were at the meeting to tell the Board that it has provided oversight of the park since 1985. Members asked for authority to require groups using the fields and facilities to provide rosters, proof of insurance and secu-

arity for all youth and adult events. "We had talked about Dixie Baseball and the Optimist League," said Alderman Greg Johnson. "We give an equal amount of money to both leagues, and we had talked about why we have two differ-

ent organizations in place." Members explained that the Optimist League plays Little League Baseball rather than Dixie Baseball and that there are other differences between the two leagues. Johnson said he was satisfied with the explanation.

The Board voted 5-0 to grant the club the administrative authority it was requesting from the City.

Murder

"During the course of the investigation, an individual by the name of Scott Druez Smith, age 27, of Wayne Street, was taken into custody and was held for investigation at the Wayne County Adult Detention Center. A preliminary autopsy report was received from the State Medical Examiner's Office in Jackson during the morning hours of Saturday, May 29. The results indicated that the child's death was ruled a homicide."

Bunch said Smith is the stepfather of Waldrop and another 2-1/2-year-old child that was also living at the residence. He indicated that the mother of the children went to work on Friday and left Smith to babysit the children. When he arrived home from work Friday night, she found

the child unresponsive.

Bunch said the family had recently moved to Waynesboro from the Brookhaven area less than three weeks ago.

"On Sunday, May 30, Scott Druez Smith was charged with murder by the Waynesboro Police Department in the death of the 17-month-old child, Ally Waldrop," Bunch said. "Smith is currently being held in the Wayne County Adult Detention Center, and the case will be bound over to a Wayne County Grand Jury."

Bunch said many details of the case could not be released, as interviews are still being conducted and evidence gathered. He said he did not expect further

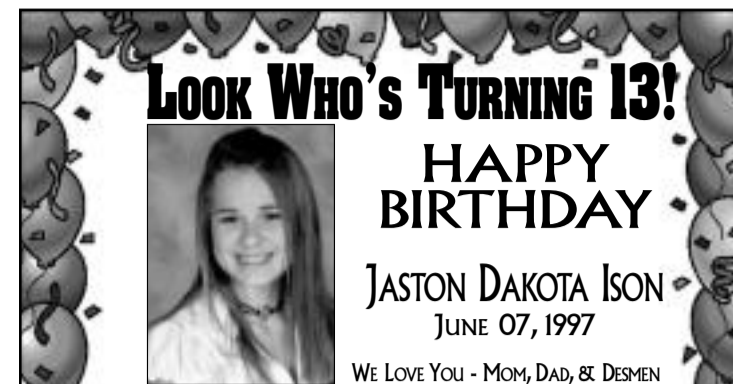
arrests to be made in the case.

Bunch said the age of the victim puts a little more emphasis on bringing suspects to justice.

"I don't know that it's different than other cases because we treat every case the same," Bunch said. "But because of the age of the victim, it certainly puts a sense of urgency on finding out what happened and who was responsible for this."

"Our department sympathizes with the family over the loss of this child, and we will make it our responsibility to seek justice for Ally. This child can't speak for herself, so we are going to be the ones speaking for her."

"This is one of the most difficult days for many of us here," Newman said. "I am amazed at the strength and grace that you have shown."

Newman then spoke about the lives of the Transocean workers, including Revette, who he described as a driller that had been on oil rigs for 29-plus years and came from an oil field family.

"He and his wife have two beautiful daughters," Newman said. "All you have to do is look at a photo of this family to realize what a lucky man he was ... and he loved all his girls."

"Of the nine men we lost, Dewey was the one that I had met personally, and I can't remember the first time I met him. But every time after that point, you would know who he was ... he was the kind of man that was instantly recognizable."

Revette is survived by his wife, Sheryl "Sherri" Revette of State Line; his mother, Katherine Revette of State Line; two daughters and a son-in-law, Andrea and Chase Cochran, and Alicia Revette, all of State Line; a brother, Kenneth Revette of State Line; and a sister, Ann Byrd of State Line.

A local memorial service was held in early May for Revette.

Newman described Revette as a man that gave his all to everything he did in life, and that is how he will be remembered by those who knew and loved him.

"If it was hunting, fishing or spending time with his family, he would give it his all," he continued.

"Dewey and Sherri were soulmates, and his family was his life."

Nationally renowned

speaker Max Lucado said the families of those who died in the Deepwater Horizon disaster have a deep sense of loss, and encouraged them to pray for guidance from God and for the nation to offer prayers to these families for healing.

"We live in a changing world and we serve an unchanging God," Lucado said. "He will help you get through this."

Lucado is a minister of preaching at Oak Hills Church in San Antonio, Texas, and is an author of several Christian bestsellers.

The families of the victims were presented with commemorative hard hats bearing the names of those who died in the rig explosion.

Among those honored at the memorial were Mississippians Shane Roshto, 22, of Franklin County; and Aaron Dale Burkeen, 37, of Neshoba County.

Those from neighboring states included Adam Weise, 24, of Yorktown, Texas; Donald Clark, 49, of Newellton, La.; Roy Kemp, 27, of Jonesville, La.; Jason Anderson of Bay City, Texas; Stephen Curtis, 39, of Georgetown, La.; along with Karl Kleppinger.

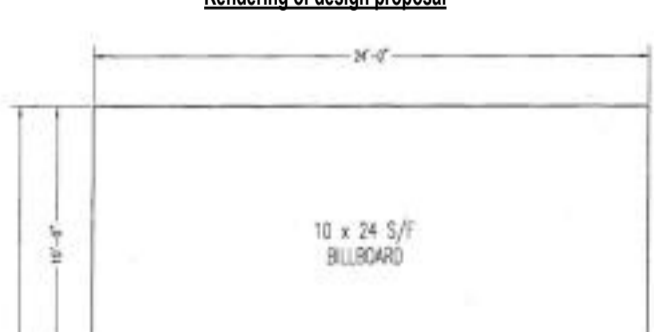

Aldermen look at curfew ordinance

The Waynesboro Board of Aldermen discussed and looked at the curfew ordinance currently on the books, looking at ways to strengthen it to help local law enforcement.

Rev. Larry Pickens spoke to the Board about the ordinance, pointing out that summer time is when enforcement is needed the most.

"Now that school is out, the kids are hanging out more and staying out later," he said. "There is nothing good for them to get into late at night out on the streets."

"Myself and Brother DeJuan Walley, who is also a preacher, have been discussing ways to keep kids out of trouble. I'm coming to the Board asking if there is a way to modify or change the ordinance so that it can be enforced better and keep our young people out of trouble."

Currently, the ordinance passed in 1993 requires children under the age of 18 to be at out of the public between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m.

Police Chief Jimmy Bunch said the ordinance is solid and enforceable, but often times a manpower issue develops when actual enforcement takes place.

"We run into a lot of manpower problems with this issue," he said. "We also run into issues where kids are on private property, perhaps their own home but out in the front yard, or they are working late at night. McDonald's, Wendy's and other places don't close until midnight or later, and other stores close at 10 p.m. but the workers have to stay later and clean up."

"If we make any changes or modifications to the ordinance, it needs to be very specific and spell out everything while allowing for some exceptions for kids that work late."

Bunch said the policy being used by his department works well.

"Our policy right now is if we see a minor walking the streets after midnight — es-

pecially if it is in an area where there has been a lot of police reports and crime — we will stop them and ask them what they are doing," Bunch said. "All of my officers know to be looking for those type of situations and to stop those individuals and see what they are doing."

"But to enforce anything fully, we would have to dedicate at least one officer to handling those situations exclusively. During the night, we don't have enough officers on duty to dedicate one to handling just curfew issues."

Alderman Greg Johnson said Laurel has a very specific curfew policy, and that perhaps Waynesboro could follow suit.

"The difference is that Laurel normally has 20-30 officers on duty at night," said Mayor Joe Taylor. "We're not in the position to have that many officers available at night."

No action was taken on the issue.

In other action, the Board:

- Approved all travel requests.
- Tabled a request from the Waynesboro-Wayne County

Library Board for the City to purchase a security system for the facility, asking for more than one quote before deciding on the matter.

• Authorized Public Works Director Harvey Hull to locate the proper spots to install street lights on Northwood Drive.

• Approved a request from Crystal Bankston to place a new mobile home on her property locatd in the new annexed area of the city. The home will replace an older model mobile home.

• Approved allowing the fire department to bring in junior auxiliary firefighters with the understanding that none of them under the age of 18 would be allowed to respond to a fire call.

• Tables making appointments to the Waynesboro Housing Authority Board.

• Reimbursed Scotty Davis for the cost of renewing his commercial driver's license.

• Approved by a 3-2 vote the printing of plans for the proposed police department renovation project.

• Approved various payments related to the rubbish site perimeter fence project.
